


Service Learning Programme – An Overview (Policy Document)

Introduction

SLP is a teaching approach that integrates students with the community, creating opportunities for the educational institution to teach students their social responsibility and empower communities through the outreach programme. St. Joseph's College of Arts & Science (Autonomous), Cuddalore, motivates the students' community to participate in community service and its development. All the extension activities are coordinated through the Service Learning Programme (SLP), which consists of a core committee, coordinators of supporting services or clubs, department level coordinators and a team of students. Shift I students take part in extension activities in the evening and Shift II students in the morning.

Aim

To foster a sense of social responsibility among the students and to inspire them to dedicate their service to people in need.

Objectives

- To nurture a sense of commitment and civic responsibility.
- To provide an opportunity for learning beyond the classroom.
- To promote learning through active participation in extension activities.
- To develop the leadership and teambuilding skills of the students.

Duties and Functions of SLP

- 1. Planning, implementing, coordinating, monitoring, and documenting the extension activities annually.
- 2. Conducting a periodical meeting on a need basis to monitor, supervise, and evaluate the ongoing extension activities.
- 3. Linking and collaborating with the Government and Non-Government Organisations to ensure the smooth execution of the extension activities.
- 4. Signing Memorandum of Understanding (MoUs) with the Non-Government Organisations and social service clubs for professional support towards the implementation of extension activities.
- 5. Regulating and supporting the 'Village Adoption Programme'.
- 6. Designing the guidelines and requirements of the extension activities.
- 7. Facilitating the awarding of two credits to the students for their extension activities.

Duties of Supporting Service or Club Coordinators

- 1. Selection of students every year for their respective supporting service or club.
- 2. Organising classroom orientation on their supporting service & coordinating all the activities stipulated by SLP.
- 3. Reporting the extension activities to the SLP office and documenting the same in their respective service club.

- 4. Maintenance of students' attendance records and facilitating the award of credits for students for their extension activities.
- 5. Motivating and enabling students to regularly engage in extension activities, thereby forming them to be responsible citizens.
- 6. Conducting Periodic Review Meeting among students, where their feedback and suggestions are forwarded to the SLP office.

General Guidelines

- 1. Each student is required to spend 60 hours working to earn two credits for the extension activities.
- 2. The Student must maintain discipline and demonstrate moral credibility during visits to villages, organisations, and while undertaking programmes. If a student misbehaves, exhibits an improper attitude, or disrupts the functioning of any activity, they will face disciplinary action enforced by the College Disciplinary Committee.
- 3. Students are required to complete their extension activity and submit a consolidated report in the prescribed format, after obtaining the signature of the coordinator of the concerned supporting service, countersigned by their HOD, by the end of the fourth Semester. Two credits are awarded to the students for the extension activities.
- 4. If the Student fails to complete their extension activities, they will not receive the credits. However, such a candidate is advised to complete the work by approaching the coordinator of the concerned supporting service and finish within the stipulated time. They can then receive credits after submitting the report to the class teacher at the end of the 6th Semester.
- 5. The coordinator of supporting service is asked to document the report of extension activities systematically done by each Student in the fourth semester and keep them in their own Department or office for future reference.
- 6. The Student is expected to maintain the Activity manual for recording all the extension activities carried out by them during studies. If the Student misses the manual, they are to obtain a duplicate manual from the SLP office.

Responsibilities of Students

- 1. Each Student is obliged by the general guidelines given by their supporting service or club.
- 2. The Student needs to be in regular contact with the coordinator for the successful completion of extension activities.
- 3. Students must focus on improving their leadership, communication, time-management skills, and familiarize themselves with social problems and methods of engaging in social service.
- 4. The Student needs to meet with the coordinator of the supporting service to obtain attendance for their work in the Student's Attendance Record.
- 5. The Student must fulfil all the requirements of extension activities for the award of 2 credits.




